Heart on Fire — Brain on Ice

When I trained for marathon walking 20 years ago our coach talked about the "Heart on Fire, Brain on Ice" theory. The walker's heart would be so on fire at the start of the marathon on race day that the walker would start out at a pace way beyond what they could maintain for 26.2 miles. The walker's brain however would be on ice — not thinking correctly. By mile ten the walker would be burning out, getting tired and starting to fade. 16.2 miles to go seemed impossible to the walker.

A fire starts as a spark on some kindling. Sometimes you must blow on the fire. You might have to fan the flame to get it going. Sometimes it smolders. Sometimes it goes out completely.

The marathon walker has a fire burning inside their heart to complete the race. It takes months of training. It is daily practice. The desire to achieve the goal needs to be fanned daily. The brain tells you to give up, but the fire in the heart continues to burn. Fanning the flame each day becomes a habit. Mile after mile the dwindling fire needs to be stoked.

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A heart on fire is contagious to those around. Some want to fan the flame. Others offer encouragement to the walker and feed the fire. The flames burn hot and long. Sometimes the flames spread. A heart on fire allows the walker to accomplish the race.

A heart on fire for the Lord acts the same way. It fuels those around them. It is contagious. It spreads. It grows strong as together we work to fan the flames of our faith. The fire stays ignited. It takes daily work to keep the flames going.

The marathon walker's brain on ice keeps emotions in check. It helps the walker maintain an even pace throughout the 26.2 miles. The brain on ice focuses on the task at hand and how to accomplish it. A brain on ice plays it safe. It is also necessary for the walker.

A heart on fire lights the emotions and sparks the flame of desire. It makes the last five miles of the race easy. It restores and renews the tired walker.

Is your heart on fire for the Lord? Will you help me fan the flames within the Oregon District?

Together let us ignite our District. Let us fan the flames of our faith. Let us set our mission on fire in the New Year.

St. John the Evangelist

A Blessed Advent and Christmas to you all. As the new Junior Pastoral Counselor for the Oregon District, it is my pleasure to write this Pastoral Corner. I love the season of Christmas especially those twelve days of Christmas (Dec. 26 to Jan. 5) as we wait for the Magi to come to see the child Jesus.

On December 27, the church celebrates the day of St. John, Apostle and Evangelist. John was one of the inner circle of Jesus' disciples along with Peter and James. John was likely one of the younger disciples in his 20s at the time of Jesus' death.

Take TIME

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven (Ecclesiastes 3:1).

At some time or another, we all suffer from discouragement, stress, and a feeling of being overwhelmed.

Here is a "TIME" guide to help you to provide strength as you serve and with whom you serve.

<u>T is for touch</u> — We have all heard about scientific studies proving that human touch can actually improve mental and physical health, boost career performance, and even increase longevity. An appropriate, well -timed touch can communicate love and acceptance; a pat on the arm, a touch on the hand, a squeeze of a shoulder, or a platonic hug can improve a person's outlook.

<u>I is for inspiration</u> – We all need inspiration. We need to know why we are toiling and sweating and sometimes putting up with difficult situations or people. Encourage your volunteers to attend worship services each week. If a volunteer finds it necessary to be absent from worship, consider providing a recording of the service.

<u>M is for motivation</u> – Two sources may be used to motivate volunteers: First, train them for their specific role through workshops, books, DVDs, and on-the-job experience. The second source is hearing real-life stories from people whose lives have been positively impacted because of the ministry for which the volunteer is working.

<u>E is for encouragement</u> – Listen! Take time to find out about the volunteers' families, hobbies, and interests. Listen with your heart, which causes people to feel special and valued.

Showing God's Mercy and Sharing His Word

Showing God's Mercy and Sharing His Word with people living with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) is what <u>BLDM</u> (who?) is all about! Yes — Bethesda Auxiliary's name and outreach has been officially changed by its governing board to: <u>Bethesda Lutheran Disability Ministries!</u> (pending government approval). Since April, a study committee has met twice a month via Zoom to re-vision the ministry to reach more people living with IDD across our nation. Not only those living in the residences of providers, but also those living with their families or in host homes in your community.

A national LWML mission grant proposal entitled, "Equipping for Disability Ministry," has been submitted for this next biennium. Please pray that it is accepted for the ballot and voted to be funded at the LWML Omaha convention in June, 2025. The funding will be used for surveying, equipping, and mentoring congregations to start their own disability ministries. Speakers and workshop presentations will be available to educate and encourage students at LCMS seminaries and colleges, and attendees at district LCMS and LWML conventions, as well as all-workers' conferences and youth gatherings. Funding will also be used to set up a social media presence and develop needed materials. Small grants will be available to congregations to jump-start their disability ministry.

LCMS Recognized Service Organization (RSO) status as been applied for and bylaws are being updated. Scholarships for college students and post-graduate students entering a vocation sharing God's Word and Jesus' love with people living with IDD will continue. Also the "Changing Lives One Heart at a Time" program for Lutheran Elementary schools will continue to be offered and is a great blessing to these children and the faculty.

Your prayers for BLDM plans are greatly appreciated. In Oregon, specifically pray that our presence into the residential facilities for Bible studies be allowed.
